COMMITTEE: Waste Management

RESOLUTION

The General Assembly,

<u>Conscious</u> of the high number of overcrowded Minnesotan landfills,

<u>Considering</u> the negative environmental impacts of overcrowded landfills,

<u>Observing</u> the relatively low recycling rates in Minnesota,

<u>Concerned</u> that not all recycling systems in Minnesota are single-sort,

<u>Recognizing</u> recently passed legislation centered on *long-term* recycling goals,

<u>Deeply disturbed</u> by the lack of corporate responsibility for problematic waste,

<u>Realizing</u> the burden that cleanup of hazardous waste puts on Minnesotan taxpayers,

Aware of the poor management of hazardous material,

- 1. <u>Authorizes</u> the construction of waste-to-energy facilities called "Resource Recovery Facilities",
- 2. <u>Recognizes</u> a Resource Recovery Facility as one that converts both organic *and* inorganic waste into usable energy,
- 3. <u>Designates</u> that one of the aforementioned Resource Recovery Facilities be constructed per 500,000 persons,
- 4. <u>Endorses</u> the construction of a central hazardous waste facility located in Minneapolis to recycle metal and materials and dispose MPCA-defined "hazardous waste,"
- 5. <u>Further resolves</u> that Resource Recovery Facilities have a drop-off station for hazardous waste to be shipped to the aforementioned central hazardous waste facility,
- 6. <u>Encourages</u> increased used of household compost bins through increased production and distribution,
- 7. <u>Requires</u> corporations to reduce hazardous waste production to 10% of total waste or lower by 2030,
- 8. <u>Declares</u> corporations to be financially responsible for all problematic hazardous waste materials,
- 9. <u>Mandates</u> the production of recycling bins increased to the size of 96 gallons for optional use by high-frequency recycling consumers.
